A MESSAGE FROM FATHER HEPNER

Dear parishioners,

I think about the future a lot. My own future, the future of our parish, the future of the Catholic Church, and even the future of the world. Did you know Google has a quantum computer that is 100 million times faster than any other that it has in its lab? Self-driving cars will soon allow you to take a nap on your way into work. The world population will begin to irrevocably decline in the next fifty years. For better or worse, the change seems to be accelerating exponentially. Our experience of Catholicism seems to be changing, too. There are 6.5 former Catholics in the U.S. for every single convert, and more than half of practicing Catholics disagree with essential, unchangeable teachings of the faith.

All this change can seem disorienting or depressing. The predictable culture that many of you grew up with seems to be eroding and it is impossible to fathom where things will be in a few months, let alone the next year. Strange as it sounds, none of this robs me of my hope. Hope is different from optimism. Optimism is a personal outlook, hope a supernatural virtue. Optimism comes from us, hope from Jesus Christ, the one who is both God and man and has gone through death and come out the other side.

I have hope because the Church, the Barque of Peter, has navigated impossibly chaotic waters since it began with eleven frightened men and a middle-aged Jewish woman two millennia ago. Horrible things have happened within and outside of the Church, yet the gates of hell have not prevailed. In fact, the Catholic Church has made the greatest advancements when the cultural tide crashed most harshly against her bow.

One reason there are fewer Catholics is because those who do not practice the faith no longer identify as Catholic. I desire them to accept Christ's salvific mission through the teachings of the Church, but I am also grateful for their honesty. God can work with that. And those who convert or return to the faith are making a wide-eyed, deliberate choice. They don't just want a piece of Catholicism. They want the whole thing. We are learning what it means to truly be active disciples rather than just people who were passively "raised Catholic." I have seen thousands of young people choose Jesus Christ and his church, knowing full well that this meant being seen as weird, out of touch bigots by the dominant authoritative voices around them.

I have witnessed many young couples fall in love

with the Church's teachings on openness to life, rejecting the lie that contraception makes them free and embracing God's plan for their marriage through natural family planning. With God's grace, they make a more sincere gift of themselves and say yes to the new life God wants to bring into the world through them.

In our own parish, I see many people choosing Christ not simply as a good thing among many, but as their first love, enthroning him in their lives over and above every other relationship and thing. Their prayer life deepens, they navigate crises with the presence of the Holy Spirit, and they deeply desire to share friendship with Christ with those around them.

No living thing can stop growing without dying. With all of the changes in the world, I believe we need to embrace the mantra, "Grow or die." The Catholic Church itself will never die, but it has severely withered up in times and places throughout history. If the Church in Bureau County is to avoid withering up, then every person who is Catholic enough to read an 800-word essay written inside their parish bulletin needs lay hold of the hope given to us by Jesus Christ and say "yes" to personal, spiritual growth and to becoming a disciple who helps make other disciples.

My time at St. Louis Parish has been incredible because I have personally witnessed the Holy Spirit doing amazing things in people's lives. You have been so open to growing, healing, courageously choosing Christ, and working to glorify his name. I am confident that Msgr. Kruse, with all of his experience, personal gifts and insights, and love of God's people, will foster the growth in you that doesn't just make this world better, but bears fruit in eternal life. Monsignor loves the Eucharist and the teachings of the Church, he cares about people's spiritual growth, and he has worked very hard to help our local Church stay afloat amidst a tumultuous time in the Church.

I love thinking about the future. I love thinking about your future. I am excited to see what God does if you let him. I look forward to seeing you in this life, perhaps in moments that we least expect. Most importantly, though, I really, really want to see you in heaven.





FOOD PANTRY UPDATE: Last weekend the Knights of Columbus collected 321 nonperishable food items and \$988 for the Bureau County Food Pantry. A vast majority of the items were high-need: 50+ boxes of breakfast cereal, 40+ jars of peanut butter and nearly 60 mac & cheese, along with boxed potatoes and canned pasta. With children now home from school, all were desperately needed and will be used immediately. 








Prayer to the Sacred Heart of Jesus
