#### A MESSAGE FROM FATHER HEPNER

Dear parishioners,

I know I'm not that old, but technology has definitely come a long way since I was a kid. We didn't have a lot of video games. And even if we did, being the youngest meant I got to "be on the same team" as my brother who was actually holding the controller. What we lacked in video games, we made up for in imagination. If my friends and I saw a pile of snow or dirt, it immediately became a mountain. We would all run towards it, pulling each other away and scrambling to the top. If you made it through the gauntlet and up to the peak, you became king of the mountain. Until someone else pulled you down.

That is how we treat much of life. Our goal is to be the singular person at the peak. The first in the class, the best athlete, the top salesperson – we scramble and climb our way up to whatever summit seems easiest to reach. But if you were to go to the peak of all peaks, the summit of being itself, you wouldn't find a singular person. At the height of all existence (indeed, holding everything *in* existence), is the Blessed Trinity, *three* persons rather than just one. God, surprisingly, is a communion of persons. And he made us in his image and likeness to be in communion as persons.

So we were made not to be a mountain, or an island out in the sea, but in communion. And we often betray our own identity by striving for self-sufficiency rather than interdependence. There is nothing wrong with seeking excellence, but when that excellence defines *who* we are, we end up with a horribly distorted view of ourselves and of the world. And when we ask, "What's wrong with the world?" this distorted view is probably the rotting core of the problem.

When the star running back breaks his leg, or the professor develops dementia, or the hardworking farmer's body begins to break down, they can face a crisis of identity. This is because their *identity* is based in what they *do*, rather than in *whose they are*. And when you can no longer do the thing that's at the core of your identity, who are you? That doesn't mean that what you did before was bad. It simply means that we need to reevaluate our identity according to God's view of us. He is, after all, the one who made us.

God's plan for us goes like this: **Relationship à Identity à Mission**. **Relationship** is *whose* we are. **Identity** is *who* we are. And **mission** is *what we do*.

Our most fundamental relationship is as a son or daughter of God. This seems so trite, but it changes everything. When you know in your bones that there is an all-powerful Father who brought the universe into existence because he's madly in love with you, it changes things. Every event, every difficulty, our past and our future all change drastically. And our idea of who we are changes. I don't have to strive for love or acceptance. I can work for excellence, but I do it out of approval rather than for approval. Relationship with God is a rock-solid foundation, whereas our own achievements are a very fragile one. And your life is important enough for a solid foundation. You are, after all, called to be a saint.

Next week we'll see how recent psychology corroborates this view of the person. But this week, let's look at the events of our lives – big and small – and ask: Am I building my identity on my relationship with God or on my own achievements? Am I acting out of my identity as a child of God or out of an orphan spirit? We all need healing and growth in this area. But thankfully we have the Holy Spirit: "You received a spirit of adoption, through which we cry, 'Abba, Father! The Spirit itself bears witness with our spirit that we are children of God." (Romans 8:15b-16). Talk to this Holy Spirit, pray the Our Father with intentionality, and let yourself grow into the person God made you to be!

# ADA PLEDGE CARDS HAVE BEEN MAILED!

We know two parish mailings in just as many weeks is unusual, but please be on the lookout for your 2020 ADA Pledge Cards, which should be arriving at your home this week.

The original 2020 campaign, which had been scheduled to launch in March, kept the goal at 2019 levels. However, Bishop Jenky – in consideration of the overall impact the pandemic is having on parishes and families throughout the diocese, further lowered the goal by 11%, bringing it back to 2015 levels. He also decided that going forward, future Diocesan Appeals will continue to be held in the fall to hopefully allow time for some of the financial pressures related to the pandemic to ease.

The Annual Diocesan Appeal adjusted 2020 goal for St. Louis Parish is \$86,484. A few weeks ago, you received a brochure describing all the important ministries the ADA makes possible. As Father Tim stated in his letter, St. Louis Parish is responsible for meeting its goal, regardless of the extent to which individual parishioners contribute. So please, prayerfully discern how you are able to support the needs of your Diocese during these unprecedented times, and return your pledge card as soon as possible. You may use the self-addressed envelope to mail it to the parish, or you may drop it with the collections at Mass. And let us thank God for this opportunity to Know, Love and Serve Him.
