A MESSAGE FROM FATHER HEPNER

Dear parishioners,

"Rejoice always. Pray without ceasing. In all circumstances give thanks, for this is the will of God for you in Christ Jesus" (1 Thess 5:16). This statement from St. Paul seems like it should have exceptions, especially this year. The number of COVID-19 cases is on the rise, as one can see from national health statistics or the local obituaries. The loneliness that many feel during the dark days of winter is magnified, and some have gone most of the year without seeing elderly or vulnerable family members. And many are in employment limbo. Add any personal, non-COVID-related tragedy on top of this, and it has been a hard, hard year.

Yet there is St. Paul's statement, staring us in the face. And Paul was no pollyannish flower child unfamiliar with suffering. He was beaten, shipwrecked, stoned almost to death, rejected by his own people, weary from travelling, and constantly concerned about the many vulnerable churches he had planted in the Mediterranean area. So what do we do with such an absolute, uncompromising statement such as this? Well, we have a choice.

We can assume that St. Paul was talking to some other Christian in a different time or culture, with different problems and a personality more suited to hardships. Or we can pull up our sleeves and do the hard work of faith. That is to say, we can choose to believe, despite the evidence in front our face, in the God-man Jesus Christ, the only one who had the authority to command us to "rejoice always" and give thanks in "all circumstances." Paul goes on to say about Jesus, "The one who calls you is faithful, and he will also accomplish it." The "it" here is our perfection, body and soul, making us "blameless for the coming of Jesus."

Perfection doesn't mean we stop suffering in this life. It means we have perfect faith, hope, and love while suffering. I know that seems like a longshot. But God is capable of doing it, and we have to at least aim for it. If we do, and we fall short, then we will spend some time in purgatory, allowing God to purify us so we can enter into heaven. But if we don't aim for the perfection of saints in heaven, and instead shoot for purgatory – well, you could say that's a "heck" of a backup plan!

Recently I found an old chalice on a shelf in the sacristy. I have no idea who gave it to the parish or how old it is, but I know it was beautiful when it was first made. It is tall, elegant, with intricate two-tone gold

decorations sprawling up its base. Now it's in bad shape, so I took it to be re-plated. This beautiful chalice once held the blood of Christ, and, after some purification and some new gold, it will once again be a worthy vessel.

I won't pretend to understand the process by which God makes us worthy vessels. I've been on the losing end of some arguments with him about it, as I'm sure you have. But I do have the benefit of hindsight, and I can see how Jesus has used every circumstance – even those of 2020 – to form me in faith, hope, and charity. "The one who calls you is faithful, and he will also accomplish it." I pray that we can each take these words into the deepest recesses of our hearts and carry them with us into the unknown hardships of the future.

One person at St. Louis who has had a joyful attitude throughout hardship and hard work is Bill "get 'er done" Uher, whom Fr. Gifford hired as maintenance man. Bill has saved the parish countless amounts of money by taking on projects, working with other parishioners, and getting the best bids. He and his wife Beth have been members of St. Louis for over 30 years and his love for his parish is only surpassed by his love for his family — especially Beth. Unfortunately, Bill had to step away from the job, and he is already greatly missed, not the least because I actually had to go to the store to buy eggs instead of Bill delivering fresh ones directly to me from his farm!

Thankfully, Tim Hermeyer has accepted the position as part-time maintenance person, and he brings a huge wealth of experience and love for the parish as well. Bill and the buildings and grounds committee have our facilities in great shape, and I know Tim will carry that forward. Please pray for both Tim and Bill and their families, and thank God for all the generous parishioners who lend their time and talent to make our Church a beautiful, worthy place for Jesus – a sign of God's plan for each of us! Rejoice always!



Parish Update: The former convent and preschool is demolished. I'm sure this makes many people sad. That sadness is appropriate - there were many faithful sisters who lived there and served St. Louis Parish. And many young children encountered Christ as they began at St. Louis School. So it is okay to mourn. But with the hope Christ gives us, it is also good to look forward to the amazing things that God will do in this parish as we adapt and continue to proclaim the Gospel to Bureau County.

The decision to demolish the preschool was not an easy one. Fr. Gifford consulted the parish groups (finance committee, buildings and grounds, and parish council) and many options were explored. Even though the exterior was beautiful, the interior was not fit for anyone to live or work in, and it would have required a lot of time and money to restore.

Ultimately, we're blessed with the right amount of space at St. Louis and we didn't need this space. Unfortunately you can't really move a brick house, therefore we couldn't sell it. So prudence led to this decision.

For now the space will be seeded with grass, which will grow in the spring as a sign of new life - the new life that the Father is always pouring into our parish. And people will have a new view of our beautiful Church, as a sign of the ever-present invitation to become part of the community that Jesus founded. We are always open to the ideas and desires of parishioners with regards to what should take the place of the grade school - green space, more parking, and/or perhaps a sign welcoming people to our parish.
