A MESSAGE FROM FATHER GIFFORD

Dear St. Louis Parishioners,

"Sufficient for a day is its own evil." These words of Our Lord (in Matthew 6:34) may not have been our first choice for a theme for a year. I confess that I have never considered it as a theme for a Retreat, Parish Mission or Day of Recollection. Nonetheless, if 2020 itself were such a retreat and I were asked to select a verse of Scripture to summarize some of the lessons the Lord has had for us this year, this would be one of the first ones to come to my This week, we had another example of this, as I am sure many of us did not know what a "derecho" was a week ago. Yet, we know now, as an intense derecho storm left our community, and so many others along its path, suddenly ravaged. With a great many downed tree limbs, as well entire trees, some of which were even uprooted, as well as downed power lines, leaving many people without power - including our church, which still does not have power as I write this – along with countless other miscellaneous damage. It may leave many of us wondering, "What next?" What more can 2020 throw at us?! I am sure I am not the only one thinking that there has never been a time when this curious little quotation from the Sermon on the Mount has made so much sense: Sufficient for a day is its own evil. When we go to bed each night, we truly know not what tomorrow holds. Yet, this all points to a solution that can be very difficult to live in practice, but is really a much better way to live, if we can try to embrace it: namely, we must learn to surrender, placing everything in God's hands, and taking each day one day, one step, one moment at a time. So, let us prayerfully consider the full context of that incredibly loaded little sentence of Our Lord.


"Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or drink, or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food and the body more than clothing? Look at the birds in the sky; they do not sow or reap, they gather nothing into barns, yet your Heavenly Father feeds them. Are not you more important than they? Can any of you by worrying add a single moment to your lifespan? Why are you anxious about clothes? Learn from the way the wildflowers grow. They do not work or spin. But I tell you that not even Solomon in all his splendor was clothed like one of them. If God so clothes the grass of the field, which grows today and is thrown into the oven tomorrow, will He not much more provide for you, O you of little faith? So do not worry and say, 'What are we to eat?' or

'What are we to drink?' or 'What are we to wear?' All these things the pagans seek. Your Heavenly Father knows that you need them all. But seek first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things will be given you besides. Do not worry about tomorrow; tomorrow will take care of itself. Sufficient for a day is its own evil." – Matthew 6:25-34

We should bear in mind that this section of the Sermon flows directly from our Lord teaching us the Our Father. He wishes us to know, not only that we can address the Lord as Our Father in spoken prayer, but that we can come to know Him as a loving and providential Father who we can trust in how we live our lives. We can place our hope in Him, so that our knowledge of Him as Our Father is neither only in the head (in the sense of intellectual knowledge) nor *only* in the heart, in the sense of being a private feeling. This knowledge is something that permeates our being and overflows into how we live our lives. It determines how we carry our crosses and set out upon another day, with whatever trials that day might still hold. We do not enter into these trials alone but walking side by side with Our Father who we can trust. May we learn to trust Him a little more each day.

WHAT HAPPENED TO THE ASSUMPTION?:

Some may have noticed that one of the great Holy Days of the year was on the calendar this past week. The Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary fell on a Saturday this year (this Saturday, August 15th). Due to our Mass schedule, this means that we were not able to celebrate a Mass for the holy day. Thankfully, it was not a day of obligation. Still, it is a great time to bring all of our prayer to Our Lady and remember how she is carried before the throne of God to bring all of our needs directly to her Son, Our Lord.

First Holy Communion
















