A MESSAGE FROM FATHER GIFFORD

Would it seem strange to you if I said that this is the most ordinary weekend we have had in a long time? Since reopening the doors of our parish church after a three month suspension of public worship, due to concerns for public health, this is the first Sunday that is neither a high feast in the Church calendar nor a secular (but no less significant and fitting) holiday, such as Father's Day. It certainly is starting to feel like getting "back into the swing of things," as I have a variety of points to address (below). Let us continue to keep our eyes on Christ and look after one another.

SR. DOROTHY: Earlier this week, we received news of the recent death of Sr. Dorothy Bertsch, the founding principal of St. Louis School. Let us honor her memory and her years of contribution to our parish, school, and community. Thanks be to God for the gift of her life and her vocation. Eternal rest grant unto her, O Lord. And let perpetual light shine upon her. May her soul and the souls of the faithful departed, through the Mercy of God, rest in peace. Amen.

A VIBRANT PARISH: In nearly three years here at Saint Louis Parish, I have had many reasons to thank God for being sent to serve such a vibrant parish community and call it home. Often, this vibrancy is evidenced by a packed schedule of events, gatherings, and various active groups. In a strange twist of providence, at a time when our events and gatherings are extraordinarily few and our various groups are forced to temporarily become virtually inactive, I find myself looking out on this same parish family compelled to describe it as a vibrant parish once more. Even with a skeleton schedule, I see a parish full of generous and determined disciples of Christ giving of their time, talent and treasure to keep the heartbeat of their parish healthy when it seems to be barely coming out of hibernation. As previously indicated, simply maintaining our weekend schedule of Sunday Masses requires quite a few additional volunteers. With the ordinary "usher" duties being adapted into something between an usher, a greeter and a friendly bouncer, it is awesome to see many of our parishioners hospitably greeting one another at the door on their arrival and helping them find an appropriate seat, as we seek to prioritize the safety of all. It is equally encouraging to see so many members of our congregation staying after to assist with cleaning, so that the Church will be ready for the attendees of the next Mass to be able to safely enter a clean and sanitized church to worship God together. I can't adequately put into words how impressed and grateful I am to see so many of our parishioners stepping up to volunteer. Thank you. At the same time, I know there are more out there who would be happy to do so and even would like to but are not able to at this time. As I acknowledged in my first appeal for help, not everybody will be able to assist with all these tasks. But, each of us is essential. Let us continue to pray for one another and to discern what contribution we are called to make to our fellow parishioners, especially by reaching out to those in need, including those most vulnerable, isolated, and alone. We have a wonderful parish. I want to sincerely thank everyone for your contributions to the life of the parish, whatever they may be!

MUSIC: At Mass last weekend, I acknowledged the decision that was made - after the printing of last weekend's bulletin - that our weekend Masses (including Sundays and Saturday vigils) will have only instrumental music with spoken responses. These times when the Church is full will not have congregational singing, for the time being. Our daily Masses and holy hours, as well as weddings and funerals, when the Church is less full and there is room for parishioners to spread out more, may be taken on a case by case basis.

THE "CHOPPING BLOCK": As we began to come up with a plan for the gradual process of reopening, to be perfectly honest, we simply didn't know what to expect. Would our Masses quickly fill up our limited capacity (due to social distancing)? Would they be practically empty, as many people might be reluctant to return? After two weeks of indoor Masses, I would say neither of those two extremes was exactly the case. However, it has begun to become clear what might be most needed and what perhaps may not be needed. While I want to leave room for those who haven't yet returned, but may intend to do so in the coming weeks and months, I am also concerned about not overextending either myself or the volunteers needed to make things available. We are probably going to be in this situation for the long haul, if you will, and need to be certain that we are working in a situation that can be sustained. So, I want to identify for you which things are "on the chopping block" - in other words, which things I am considering removing from the schedule if this weekend does not demonstrate a greater need for them than we have seen in recent weeks. They are the 6 PM Mass on Saturday and the 8:30 AM Outdoor Distribution of Holy Communion. If either of these two things is of great value to you or others, please let me know as soon as possible. Otherwise, if this weekend does not demonstrate a greater need for them, they may be removed from the schedule as early as the weekend of July 11-12th.

INDEPENDENCE DAY MASS: Since we will still have two Masses (see above) next Saturday, July 4, and they will be Vigil Masses for the 14th Sunday of Ordinary Time, we are limited in our options for offering an official "Independence Day Mass." This is even truer, because an additional Mass, as discussed, requires additional volunteers, which are in even higher demand on a holiday. Friday, July 3rd is the Feast of Saint Thomas the Apostle, which is not permitted to be skipped. However, I am certain that Saint Thomas would be happy to join us in praying for our nation! So, the morning Mass on Friday, July 3rd will be moved to 9 AM and will include special prayers for our nation (but will still be offered for the Feast of Thomas the Apostle). In order to reduce the amount of work needing to be done on a holiday, we will not close the Church between Mass and the private prayer time slot, so attendees of Mass are asked to be sure to mark your pew with a "used" card, to ensure that someone coming in to pray does not use your pew before it has been cleaned.

PRAYERS FOR OUR COUNTRY: In order to continue our prayers for our country, our July 2020 Vision Holy Hour will be offered For Greater Unity in Pursuit of the Common Good Within our Nation. This Holy Hour will be offered on <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>July 7th at 7 PM in the main Church</u>. This also would be an event in which all attendees would be asked to mark their pews with a "used" card. I will elaborate on this topic in the coming weeks.


